Dear Parents,

This week, we'll learn about "A Wife for Isaac" (Genesis 24– 25). As Abraham grew old, he wanted to find a wife for his son, Isaac, from his own people. He sent his servant on a journey, trusting God to help. The servant prayed for a sign, asking that the right woman offer water for both him and his camels. God answered quickly, and Rebekah, a woman from Abraham's people, did just that. Rebekah agreed to return with the servant and marry Isaac. Through this, God showed His faithfulness, just as He sends Jesus to seek and save us.

I hope this message will inspire your child to grow in the love and light of Jesus. To help reinforce the lesson at home, please discuss the following points with your child:

□ Prayer and Trust: Discuss how the servant trusted God's guidance and how we can trust God with our needs too.

☐ **Jesus Seeks Us:** Explain how God sent Jesus to seek and save us, just like the servant found a wife for Isaac.

Pray with your child, thanking God for His faithfulness and for sending Jesus to bring us closer to Him.


A Wife for Isaac

BIBLE PASSAGE: Genesis 24~25

KEY PASSAGE: Psalm 100:5

BIG PICTURE QUESTION: Does God keep His promises?

Yes, God always keeps His promises because He is faithful.



Abraham lived many years. Before he died, he wanted to find a wife for his son Isaac. He asked his best servant to find Isaac a wife—not from the Canaanites who lived near them, but from his own people. This was a hard job because the woman would need to agree to move away from her family

and come to the land God had promised to Abraham. Abraham said, "The Lord will send an angel before you." God would help

the servant with this task.

The servant took 10 camels with him on the journey to Abraham's homeland. When the servant arrived, he stopped with the camels at a well outside of a town. In the



evenings, women would come and draw water from this well.

The servant prayed to God. He said, "When the young women come to draw water, I will say 'May I have a drink, too?' If one of the women says, 'Drink, and I'll also draw water for your camels,' let her be the woman you have chosen for Abraham's son Isaac."

Before the servant had finished his prayer, Rebekah walked up to the well with a jug on her shoulder. She was not married, and she was part of Abraham's people. The servant saw that she was very beautiful. She could be a perfect wife for Isaac!

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The servant said, "Please let me have a little water from your jug." Rebekah replied, "Drink, and I'll also draw water for your camels." God had answered the servant's prayer; this was the woman God had chosen!

The servant gave gifts to Rebekah—a gold ring and two gold bracelets—and asked if he could stay in her father's house for the night. When she said yes, the servant knelt and worshiped God. God had showed His faithfulness and kindness to Abraham.

They went to Rebekah's house, where the servant met her father Bethuel and her brother Laban.

The servant told Bethuel and Laban all that had happened. They agreed with Rebekah that she should be Isaac's wife. The servant gave the family many gifts, and then they returned to Canaan. Isaac loved Rebekah, and she became his wife.

God was faithful to provide a wife for Isaac. Abraham's servant brought back Rebekah so Isaac could know and love her. God sent His servant—Jesus—to seek and save people from sin and death. Jesus was faithful. He died and rose again so that people could know and love Him.
